

Portobello Community Council Annual Report

2021

Portobello Community Council's last AGM was in October 2020, delayed due to the Coronavirus pandemic. As such this AGM covers a shorter seven-month period.

The community council has continued to run virtual meetings, these meetings have been well attended, and offer a degree of flexibility which physical meetings cannot. When restrictions lift we should consider how best to blend the opportunities of virtual meetings with the strength of in-person meetings. Meetings have focused on our primary purpose to consult the residents and business owners of Portobello, and to make their views known to public authorities, service providers and other stakeholders.

To this end, the community council has concentrated on three main objectives:

- 1. Raise awareness of matters of community interest
- 2. Encourage engagement in community matters by residents, businesses & groups
- Provide a voice for the community by gathering feedback and making representations, where relevant

A mixture of online and offline methods have been deployed to achieve these aims.

- The PCC website is updated regularly with public notices, relevant community news as well as formal reports and documentation
- The Facebook page is also regularly updated with public notices and other items of community interest
- The Twitter feed is actively updated and used to share community info
- Regular email newsletters are distributed with information and links

For those who are not online

- The noticeboard network is regularly refreshed
- A column is provided for the Porty Reporter
- We would also normally look to, but not currently possible:
 - The PCC area in Portobello Library is kept up to date
 - Consultations at drop-in sessions and public events

Community councillors also liaise with community representatives, local police officers and elected members in helping identify areas of priority or greatest need.

Recent consultations

Portobello Community Council has run the following consultations in the last seven months. These allow us to learn of community views and to reflect those to decision makers:

- 14 Bath St, former George Cinema consultation to inform response to residential planning application
- Pipe Ln consultation to inform response to residential planning application

- Future use of Portobello Town Hall consultation to gauge community approval of a couple of submitted bids, also polling for questions to help the community better understand the bids
- Pipe Ln consultation on proposals for a reimagined Pipe Lane public toilet on Portobello Prom, combining this with catering, or other, facilities
- Brunstane Rd / Joppa Triangle consultation results analysed and shared with City of Edinburgh Council Transport and Environment committee

We have also encouraged engagement with City of Edinburgh Consultations, including ongoing Spaces for People review.

Local priorities

The community council has also been active on the following topics:

- Scottish Parliament election organised hustings for Edinburgh Eastern constituency, with all four candidates attending
- Public toilet provision picked up on local feelings on anti-social behaviour, fed back to City of Edinburgh Council and pressured for reopening of local toilets
- Seafield continuing work with neighbouring community councils, the City of Edinburgh Council & other partners regarding this area which is identified for mixed residential led development in the emerging City Plan
- Coordinate with City of Edinburgh Council on their "Shop Local" campaign, including getting local businesses involved
- Road safety coordinate with City of Edinburgh councillors and officials regarding transport improvements at Kings Rd junction following fatal collisions, and at Abercorn Terrace following a collision
- Kings Place continuing discussions with City of Edinburgh Council

Public Notices

The PCC receives a significant volume of public notices from the City Council, Scottish Government agencies and other public bodies. These include Traffic Orders, Licensing Applications, Planning Applications, funding opportunities, consultations on public matters, meeting notices, agenda and reports. As far as possible, these notices are published on the PCC website, Facebook and Twitter feeds so that members of the public can keep up to date.

- Licensing application for mobile sauna on Portobello Promenade poll community for any questions they had on this application
- Safety signage on the beach and Prom inform community on this initiate, which follows on from earlier meeting with emergency services and the community council

Portobello Community Council Financial Report 2020/21

This statement of account for the year 2020/21 was prepared for the PCC virtual Annual General Meeting held on 31st May 2021. Please note that this report will not make reference to any money held by PCC in the Traders' Account as the funds were collected by local businesspeople for Christmas lights and special events. These funds cannot be used for the standard business of the PCC. Should anyone require information about those funds, please contact the PCC treasurer, email address: treasurer@portobellocc.org

Business Account

The activities of the community council resulted in a surplus for the year of £286.61 compared with the loss of £249.77 for the year ending 31st March 2020.

I will now draw your attention to the main items of income and expenditure for the year.

Income

The main source of income was the grant of £906.74 received from the City of Edinburgh Council which is based on a standard lump sum payment plus an additional per capita contribution related to the population for the area. Other income was a payment in arrears from Action Porty for a share of Basecamp costs, an arrangement which has now ceased, along with the insurance settlement for damage to an interpretation board of £197.72. A half contribution of £50.00 for the agreed share of the insurance excess was received from Portobello Amenity Society.

Expenditure

The main items of expenditure were £259.40 for insurance, £477.23 for Information Communication Technology costs including the fee for using Basecamp. The charge of £40.00 was incurred for registration with the Information Commissioner's Office for the calendar years of 2021.

Unfortunately one of the seaside interpretation boards was damaged which necessitated a repair costing £297.72, partly met by the insurance claim, and the only other expenditure was the transfer of £3.50 to the Traders' account due to an accounting error when the funds were separated in 2017.

It has to be noted that payment of rent for room hire to hold meetings has not been necessary this year as all meetings have been held online due to the current government restrictions on face to face meetings.

Balance Sheet

Turning to the Balance Sheet, the PCC as at 31st March 2021 had £1908.27 cash in the business account held by the Bank of Scotland compared with £1621.66 at the end of March 2020. We do not hold any petty cash. I have accounted for a liability of £108.34 which is to cover the fees for Basecamp up until 31st March 2021. This results in an accumulated surplus of £1,799.93, an increase of £516.83 over the financial year.

Financial Position

The financial position of the community council remains strong with all known liabilities being accounted for and forecast expenditure remaining below income. This will enable the community council to continue all of its functions in the coming year.


Portobello and Craigmillar Ward population mid-year estimate, 2019









Website traffic

 As in previous years, day-to-day usage driven by community matters




Website Demographics


