 - 2.3. Gather responses and feed those back to the developer, elected reps and planning department


The consultation ran from Wednesday, 2 Sept to Sunday, 6 Sept.








The main consultation page on the PCC website consisted of brief details about the design proposals.

Fishwives Causeway is the major cycle route into the centre of town from Portobello. Adding all these homes and cars and pedestrians to this street without providing dedicated cycle lanes would be unhelpful, dangerous and go against the need to encourage non-carbon, healthy transport. For this development to go ahead it needs to take on board the need to support, rather than impede, green transport.

A major issue for those living in flats/ tenements in Portobello is the lack of secure and covered bicycle storage facilities. This leads to people either not using bikes or parking them in the stairs in a way that obstructs neighbours. Ensuring sufficient secure and covered bicycle storage facilities in this development is crucial.




